From the Rabbi

Remarks by Rabbi Michael Berk:

Shabbat Shalom! I remember that when I was the rabbi here it impressed me how those who serve this congregation as rabbis never really leave the community. When I was your Associate Rabbi with Rabbi Robins, Rabbi Gitin was, of course, living in town, as was Rabbi Levy, my predecessor, and Rabbi Freund, of blessed memory. There's something lovable about this historic congregation. Once you know it, you don't want to leave it! So, I'm privileged that in my current position as Regional Director for the Union for Reform Judaism, I'm able to maintain my relationships with so many people here.

One of the strengths of this congregation has always been the roots people have here. Even in the midst of Silicon Valley, a place known for fortunes coming and going and, along with them, those who have sought those fortunes, this community has maintained a core of committed and active Jews who have continued to build a vibrant Jewish community for over 150 years. This characteristic has set the tone for how you welcome rabbis here - namely, you have always welcomed us warmly and with the hope the relationship would last a very long time. Tonight we are celebrating that, once again, you are expressing your love and loyalty to your rabbi, this time Dana Magat, by granting him the title Senior Rabbi which comes with the hope that Dana, his wife, Cheri, and his children Shira and Raya will live and grow and lead in this congregation for a long time to come. *Ken yehi ratzon*, may this be God's will.

As I think about the rabbis who have been most appreciated by this congregation, the one thing I find common among them is they are warm and *haimish* -- like you are! It's probably important in other communities, but here I can state with a certainty that the members of this congregation have always

wanted a rabbi they can respect and admire, to be sure, but one who is a friend, someone they genuinely care for and feel cares for them. In the years that Rabbi Magat has been here, like you, I've grown quite fond of him - he is a rabbi with integrity, and a person of great *menschlichkeit*.

He reminds me of a story that our colleague, Rabbi Janet Marder (Senior Rabbi at Congregation Beth Am and President of the Central Conference of American Rabbis), once told. In a post-Halloween discussion with her youngest daughter Rachel a few years ago, Rabbi Marder was trying to persuade her that candy and junk food weren't good for her. "You shouldn't eat that stuff," she said. "Have respect for your body. You know, your body is a temple." "No way!" her Rachel said. "My body is a *shul*!"

"Some rabbis," Janet wrote, "are like temples; some are more like *shuls*. Some carry within them the grandeur and magnificence of our ancient tradition; they convey the Holy Presence

through the power of their Torah-teaching. Others have a warm and *haimish* presence; they put us at ease; they're easy to confide in; we want to be close to them."

I come here tonight, representing the Reform Movement, to pay tribute to my friend and colleague Dana Magat - a rabbi who embodies both temple and *shul*; devoted to our sacred tradition, yet down-to-earth, warm-hearted and caring.

We read in the Mishna some words that suggest what this night is all about: "*Asei lecha rav*" - which can be translated, "Get yourself a rabbi." The truth is, you don't get yourself a rabbi just by conducting a search, drawing up a contract and having him sign on the dotted line. You only get a rabbi over time. Slowly, patiently you make him your rabbi; slowly, patiently, you begin to understand what this precious and unique relationship is all about.

Consider one image of the rabbi's role, over here by the Ark. It's the *ner tamid*, the eternal light. The rabbi must be a source of enlightenment; a reservoir of eternal truths, radiating always the steady, unwavering light of faith. The rabbi must burn with prophetic fire, speaking out with courage on the critical issues of our time; seeking integrity, not merely popularity; holding fast to the flame of truth even in the midst of controversy; inspiring and sometimes even castigating the congregation to live up to our Jewish ethical ideals. As the focal point of all eyes on the bima, the rabbi must bring light and warmth to the sanctuary, infusing worship with a sense of spirituality, lifting up the souls of the congregation and helping them connect with the holy.

This image has a certain beauty to it - and, of course, a danger as well. The rabbi as eternal light, after all, is up high, far away from the congregation, closer to the Torah, closer to God, than you are. Rabbis who see themselves, and are seen, as the *ner tamid*, run the risk of becoming arrogant and remote, self-important and self-righteous. Let me offer an image of a rabbi that I prefer: the *yad*, the wooden or silver pointer that Jews use to read the Torah. *Yad* is the Hebrew word for "hand," and so this instrument is the extension of the human hand. Some "*yads*" are humble and some are highly polished, but all point, with straightness and integrity, back to Torah, the source of our wisdom. And so the rabbi's task is to direct our attention to ultimate concerns, to keep us focused, in the swirl of congregational business, on why we do what we do. The *yad* is not the Torah; the *yad* is a pointer, a gateway to Torah. And so a rabbi is not the source of all truth but one who helps you find your place in the tradition; who guides you on your Jewish journey; who brings you to the sacred text and helps you discover your own voice. Above all, the *yad* is a symbol of partnership and collaboration. Without someone to read the Torah, the *yad* dangles uselessly over there in the Ark. And without congregants who dream and plan and work to make the dreams come true, a rabbi's existence is pointless.

Tonight you celebrate the covenantal partnership you have formed with the rabbi who delivered himself to you five

years ago. By now, you know who Rabbi Dana Magat is: a gifted teacher; a sensitive and compassionate counselor; a person of conscience who holds fast to his convictions and speaks his mind forthrightly, but one who listens equally well, and welcomes your forthright responses. He is, at bottom, a deeply honest and loyal person - a person of faith, whose basic core of goodness shines through with great clarity and simplicity. He will give you the best he has to offer. He will believe in you and honor his covenant with you as long as it endures.

Blessed is this congregation, which has chosen so wisely, and which, like its rabbi, is both temple and *shul* -- a place where the tradition lives, a *haimish* community of warmth and closeness. May God bless both of you in the sacred work you will do together.

- It feels good to be able to help our sister congregation and to share events within our auxiliaries, youth groups, and, possibly, within our general congregations.
- We continue to attract new members - several of whom attended our successful picnic at Oak Meadow Park.
- Our recent Wine Tasting fund raiser was a social and financial success, raising almost \$10,000.
- Our pre-school, under the leadership of Barbara Smead, with its outstanding reputation in a widening area, has proven itself a wise investment in time, effort, and money as we saw it turn in a healthy profit in 2003-2004.

My goal this year as President is to build on these successes through increased collaboration and open communication. I'm a firm believer that "two heads are better than one." In addition, more than ever, Rabbi Magat, the Temple staff, the Board of Trustees, the Committees, and Auxiliaries are working together to discuss and meet each challenge we face.

I'm also calling on you, fellow congregant. Will you work with me to lead or be a member of a committee? Do you have ideas or suggestions you've been nurturing for a while? Now is the time for you to step forward. I'm encouraging you to get involved. The Temple needs you!! From Our Treasurer

As we begin fiscal 2004-2005, Temple Emanu-el is poised to experience its best year in a very long time.

- We recently invested Rabbi Magat as our Senior Rabbi,
- Our Education, Office and Support Staff is strong and cohesive,
- The Religious School Building renovation has begun, making the building safe for our children and a comfortable place for learning and sharing, and
- Our pre-school is doing well (it is now profitable!)

We can be proud of the organization we support. And support it we must. With all the positives, let's not forget about the Temple's on-going operating challenges. As projected, we did finish FY 2003-2004 with a major deficit, something we cannot sustain over the long-term. Several significant projects were left undone, not including money we would like to invest in special programs for singles, the newly married, young families, seniors, and those 'in betweeners' seeking religious sustenance and intellectual fulfillment from our programs.

Approximately 85% of the temple's operating budget is spent on fixed expenses: salaries, utilities, phone, postage, etc. To ensure the temple continues to provide services we want, we must ensure the temple has the required operating funds.

Most temples receive approximately 75% of their operating budget from dues. At Temple Emanu-El this number is closer to 55%. The Dues Committee and Board of Trustees are working together to increase that percentage using the Fair Share program that asks each member to pay his or her fair share towards the temple's operating budget. If we are to succeed we must all evaluate our commitment to the temple. If each of us were to commit to what is really reasonable, the temple's operating problems would be solved. For that to happen, each of us must make the commitment to the temple, which provides a home in which Judaism can thrive.

Other Jewish community organizations depend on temples and synagogues to educate our young and create the commitment to our faith through strong, meaningful religious school programs and Shabbat and holy day religious services. I ask you to review your commitment to the temple and do the right thing.

A portion of your dues goes to support a variety of programs and benefits including The Jewish Chautauqua Society (JCS), The Reform on Campus (ROC) Program, The ACHIM Corps Project and the periodical that we all receive, The ACHIM Magazine. For over a hundred years, the JCS "has provided knowledge and education about Jews and Judaism, has brought about an appreciation of the Jewish people, their history, religion, and culture, and has built bridges of understanding between peoples of all faiths and cultures. JCS is the interfaith education program of the NFTB." Since 1994, the ROC program has provided "direct financial grants to groups that seek to strengthen Reform Judaism on college campuses. NFTB's goal is to encourage the creation of quality programs of Jewish content that will appeal to a broad range of Reform college students."

"NFTB's innovative Achim Corps programs speak to our members as fathers, sons, spouses, friends, and especially, as brothers. Our goal is to increase our ranks with men infused with a new sense of fellowship, a stronger confidence as Reform Jews, and a renewed commitment to perform mitzvot for their temple and their community. Current Achim Corps Programs include an NFTB Men's Health Initiative Program, the NFTB Men and Observance Series, and the NFTB Men and Contemporary Roles Program, best exemplified by NFTB's sponsorship of the URJ publication 'And You Shall Teach Them to Your Sons'."

Women of Reform Judaism: National Activities

On June 21, several leaders represented WRJ at the United Nations Department of Public Information historic first seminar on anti-Semitism. Helene H. Waranch, WRJ President, and Shelley Lindauer, Executive Director, were among the 600 attendees. The full day seminar included several panels of exceptional speakers, including Elie Wiesel and leaders of major Jewish organizations, but also Christian, Muslim and Hindu activists against anti-Semitism. Welcome to United Nations Headquarters (Opening Remarks)

In holding this series of seminars, the United Nations is true to one of the most sacred purposes of the world's peoples in whose name the Organization was founded: "to practise tolerance and live together in peace with one another as good

neighbours." No Muslim, no Jew, no Christian, no Hindu, no Buddhist - no one who is true to the principles of any of the world's faiths, no one who claims a cultural, national or religious identity based on values such as truth, decency and justice - can be neutral in the fight against intolerance.

Clearly, our success in this struggle depends on the effort we make to educate ourselves and our children. Intolerance has to be unlearned.

Tolerance and mutual respect have to be learnt.

Elie Wiesel wrote: "There is divine beauty in learning, just as there is human beauty in tolerance. To learn means to accept the postulate that life did not begin at my birth. Others have been here before me, and I walk in their footsteps. The books I have read were composed by generations of fathers and sons, mothers and daughters, teachers and disciples. I am the sum total of their experiences, their quests. And so are you."

Although you won't receive this copy of Connections until August, to meet the deadline I'm writing my article on July 4. I always look at holidays, events, etc., with a particularly Jewish perspective. While all Americans celebrate the birth of our country today, I'm particularly grateful that my grandparents came to America so that my family and I can practice our Judaism openly and unafraid.

Like many others, I often take for granted the religious freedom given as a basic right in the United States. HIGH HOLY DAYS

We're nearing the completion of the annual cycle on the Hebrew calendar that announces the coming of the High Holy Days, our Ten Days of Awe beginning with Rosh Hashanah when the Book of Life is opened until Yom Kippur when the book is sealed for another year. During that time we pray individually and as a community, to cleanse ourselves of personal transgressions and to pray for the healing of the world in which we live.

We will greet the New Year at the San Jose Civic Auditorium. Preparations are well underway and, with this being our second year at the auditorium, we anticipate a smoother observance than last year.

Your High Holy Day Packet
